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# 1. Context Describe the location of your application and your proposed headquarters site

Describe the geographical area covered by the application and why it should be considered for hosting the headquarters?

The Kingdom of Fife is located on the East coast of Scotland and is well connected by rail, road, river and air travel opening up the Kingdom to national and international opportunities, collaborations and alliances. Steeped in heritage and often at the forefront of innovation and engineering, Fife is home to 3 iconic bridges: the Forth Road bridge, the Queensferry Crossing and the UNESCO World Heritage Site (WHS) Forth Bridge respectively. The latter is a structure which still commands worldwide attention more than 130 years after it opened. In brief, the socio-economic opportunities of the WHS are being realised via a UNESCO approved Action/Management Plan in addition to regionally, via Edinburgh and South East Scotland City Deal Regional Prosperity Framework (Sept 2021) and respective local authority tourism or economic development strategies.

Fife's enviable location secures its position as a commutable region for 70% of Scotland's central population belt and with first-class lifestyle amenities, over 100 miles of beautiful coastline, high quality affordable housing, excellent schools, internationally recognised further and higher education establishments including the University of St Andrews, Fife is rapidly becoming a location of choice for organisations, individuals and families.

As the 3<sup>rd</sup> largest local authority in Scotland with a population of 365,000 people, Fife is located within two City Regions and is a connected, innovative, resourceful, resilient and an attractive location with a strong history of regional collaborations, productivity and being globally competitive in delivering value for money strategic investments.

Three of Fife's four UK parliamentary constituency areas are being put forward for consideration

- Glenrothes
- · Kirkcaldy and Cowdenbeath
- Dunfermline and West Fife

Within each of these areas, strategic investment sites have been identified which harness the economic and social attributes of Fife, not least the regions strong manufacturing business base but also the

	physical and digital infrastructure benefits that Fife can provide. ensuring that the proposed HQ operation are fully enabled for connectivity and collaboration – digitally and in person.

The development of this application aligns to Fife's Local Outcome Improvement (LOIP) Plan: Plan 4 Fife which was approved in 2017 and is developed and supported by Fife's strategic partnership board which includes lead partners: Fife Council, Scottish Enterprise, Scottish Fire and Rescue Service, Police Scotland, Skills Development Scotland, Department of Work and Pensions, NHS Fife, Fife's Business Community, Fife College, University of St Andrews amongst others.
		To deliver the LOIP we work via corporate Leadership structures which are place or people based collaborative partnerships encompassing public and third sector organisations, community anchor organisations and links to the private sector. Each seek to support holistic socio-economic development with work aligning nationally to Levelling Up objectives and missions including "Closing the Productivity Gap" and "Pride of Place"
		Developing this application supports the work of the Fife Partnership Board but also aligns with the strong and diverse business base across Fife much of which is responsible for or involved with innovation and research or development activity. Prospective locations have therefore been identified with this in mind and where relevant, in collaboration with industry and landowners.

Describe the proposed site(s) for the national headquarters	High level scoping has identified a number of sites which have potential for GBRHQ development. All are capable of superfast digital infrastructure and are located close to customers, collaborators, supply chains and available workforce in addition to being served by public transport corridors including the M90 motorway, A92 and critically an inter and intra rail network comprising the East Coast mainline and Fife Circle respectively.
	We have identified 7 strategic investment sites within Fife's UK Parliamentary constituencies which have potential to meet the GBRHQ criteria.
	Our Invest Fife Team would work with GBR to support full appraisal and delivery of the proposed Headquarters. Within Mid Fife this includes the progression and publicity of a Mid Fife Strategic Investment Prospectus detailing a range of available sites and candidate locations. Within South-West Fife including Inverkeithing and Rosyth, we would align existing marketing collateral and joint working with Scottish Enterprise/SDI to ensure that sites identified gain regional or national recognition.

Invest Fife have a proven track record supporting investment value of £547M and upwards of 5000 new jobs over the last 10 years. They offer a 'gateway' service co-ordinating Council or partnership support including regulatory and financial assistance signposting.


This activity to date, relevant to rail investment, has included progressing with partners proposals for strategic investment at Longannet which culminated in the Scottish Government committing to establish a 'rail research hub' within Transport Scotland's 'rail decarbonisation action plan' published in July 2020. This complemented a proposal, at that time, for the construction of a UK production headquarters for an international high-speed train operator (Talgo). It also recognised Fife's locational potential in east central Scotland to serve national and international networks and to enable the roll out of electrified rail networks and to serve freight or passenger needs.

We have highlighted just a few potential sites below giving an indication of scope and scale of our available investment locations from sites more suitable to design and build to premium flagship office space ready now to accelerate location and growth of GBRHQ.

#### Kirkcaldy and Cowdenbeath Constituency

Kirkcaldy is steeped in history and is the birthplace of Adam Smith, the Father of Economics (1723) and Sandford Fleming, the Scottish Canadian inventor and engineer (1827) who promoted the worldwide use of standard time zones and 24 hours clocks, which of course has been critically important to rail travel timetabling and operation. He is also credited with designing much of Intercolonial Railway of Canada. Both these "sons of Kirkcaldy" helped shape the modern world. A key site for consideration would be:

John Smith Business Park (JSBP) – located 25 miles from Edinburgh is Fife's premier business park. An established business park located close to Junction 2A of the A92 JSBP is already home to several business and organisation HQs. JSBP is located in the Chapel area of Kirkcaldy within 3 miles northwest of the town centre and East Coast Main Line Kirkcaldy Train Station which is supported by active travel networks including bike hire and secure storage and accessible cycle paths (20 minute cycle from station to business park) as well as frequent buses from the station to Chapel area (every 10 minutes)





lona House located at JSBP would be our immediate offer to GBR. This is superfast broadband enabled 4 storey premium flagship office building comprising a total of 2597.5 sq m. which can be available on a whole building or floor and floor basis. This flagship space is ready now in move in condition with enabled video conferencing facilities and meeting rooms and digital infrastructure in place to enable multiple data processing and payments transactions. Average building rental rates based on recent occupiers and those across the rest of JSPB, are competitive and offer excellent value for money. Kirkcaldy has transitioned from traditional industries including Nairn's linoleum production, with the brand's global exports helping to coin the phrase "Kirkcaldy the town that floored the world" and Kirkcaldy is fondly also referenced in the famous "Boy in the Train" poem by Mary Campbell Smith. Sites such as Nairn's former factories have been cleared or redeveloped and re-used which recognises the towns' ability to transform. This work has been strongly supported by the community, taking part in several development charrettes with many active third sector anchor organisations, the private sector and the wider community helping to deliver and promote this success.

#### **Dunfermline and West Fife Constituency**

Dunfermline is the Ancient Capital of Scotland, burial place of Kings and Queens, the Birthplace of Andrew Carnegie, situated just 30 minutes from Edinburgh, amidst wonderful views of the UNESCO World Heritage Forth Bridge, and beautiful coastlines and countryside, described as "an undersold gem of a city, with wonderful architecture and lots to see". Our high-level scoping has identified four potential sites within this constituency, all are well connected and close to Inverkeithing station on the East Coast Main line and the Forth Bridge Heritage sites. **Two of these identified sites** are detailed below:

- **1.Queensferry One Development Land** has unrivalled connectivity and benefits from direct port, rail and motorway access, with quayside access available via two adjacent port operators. Public transport is also available immediately adjacent to the site including the Ferrytoll Park & Ride providing 1,050 car spaces with shuttle buses run to and from Inverkeithing Station. With over 120 acres of developable land, Queensferry One provides one of the largest development sites across the Central Belt of Scotland with a highly skilled workforce in the surrounding area.
- 2. Fife Interchange Fife Interchange is a major business park with a first-class location on the M90, multiple transport connections and excellent workforce availability. This is already home to Amazon UK's 1.1 million sq. ft fulfilment centre. It is situated in the South of Fife, approximately 3 miles North of the Forth Road Bridge and close to Forth Bridge.

Sites across and close to Fife Circle areas including Thornton and Markinch within the Glenrothes constituency and Lochgelly/Cowdenbeath (Kirkcaldy and Cowdenbeath constituency) are also important. The Fife circle rail line is an internal route with multiple stations including those of the largest communities including Cowdenbeath, Lochgelly and Thornton respectively.

As illustrated within the recently published Mid Fife prospectus (2021) the opportunity does exist to use this existing rail infrastructure to integrate these existing communities sustainably with the wider population base of Fife and indeed Scotland. In addition, the future enhancement perhaps including electrification of this line offers an opportunity for new technologies such as hydrogen to be piloted for example with freight

connections to utilise the direct rail link to Grangemouth in central Scotland and beyond. This innovation would ensure that a co-located GBRHQ directly benefited and that future mutual benefits arose.

	Opportunities for growth within the supply chain would also be created helping to level up opportunity, boost productivity, pay and jobs and close the productivity gap via tailored and integrated employability programmes created by the demand generated directly from the HQ and indirectly via supply chain, backfill, increased demand on associated services and other demand led business growth, all of which would to help spread the opportunities and grow the private sector business base as well as improving local community living and pride of place.	
		Fife would seek to include GBR within our existing relationship management and civic/corporate engagement systems ensuring that mutual benefit can be gained from the promotion and profile raising of the organisation and of the region respectively. The hosting of the GBRHQ would add to the existing network of nationally headquarters organisations within Fife including the R&A, Babcock Marine, Raytheon, Harlland and Wolfe, Ingenico and others including Diageo. These business networks will increase the acumen and profile of Fife in addition to providing opportunities for business to business and supply chain engagement and additional employment.

Fife is an attractive location for GBRHQ. The Kingdom is easily accessible by rail, road, river and air connectivity to Scotland, the UK and internationally.

Fife is home to globally recognised history and heritage, not least Forth Bridge (known to rail engineers simply as 'The Bridge') with Network Rail looking to develop The Forth Bridge Experience - a Sydney Harbour Bridge type adventure walk onto the Forth Bridge with visitor centre situated at the south end of the Forth Bridge. The Forth Bridge also features in the UNESCO Trail with the Forth Bridge being one of the steps in this recently launched UNESCO Trail and Scotland is the first country in the world to launch such a trail. The Forth Bridge team is an active participant on social media for this trail using the #UNESCOTrail

Fife is digitally connected with superfast broadband and is home to innovation and collaborations and has been at the forefront of above average Scottish manufacturing business activity which has given rise to diversified sector activity including advanced manufacturing and robotics as evidenced by the recently progressed Babcock International commitment to establish an Arroll Gibb Innovation Campus (AGIC) development at Rosyth waterfront and port/s.



What do you think makes your town/city best suited as the location for Great British Railways' national headquarters? cont.

AGIC is to be a global centre of excellence, focused on serving the marine (ships and offshore), nuclear and energy transition sectors, and on building related knowledge and skills.

Fife's innovation activity has also enabled Fife to be at the forefront of renewable sector development including and perhaps of critical interest to GBR the development, production and storage of Hydrogen at Methil Energy Park and Westfield respectively. This is not only leading in climate change but has the potential for high efficiencies in low carbon rail technology clusters including electrification. It also links to academia and innovation networks including that of University of St Andrews and Partners who at Eden Campus in the North of Fife are helping to build hydrogen transport networks and partnering regionally to explore future collaborations in the fields of sustainable mobility and low carbon energy.

The accessibility of our rural and urban places and quality of life including quality affordable homes enables an attractive and sought-after work/life balance. This had been recognised with Fife winning accolades for outdoor activity experiences and in the region consistently being identified as a regional if not national asset with award winning beaches, forests, and greenspace.

GBRHQ locating in Fife would be supported by our collaborative skills development work.


Fife is a partner in the Edinburgh and South East Scotland City Region Deal's Integrated Regional Employability and Skills (IRES) Programme. and Fife's Chief Executive is the Chair of the IRES Board, Fife also provides the lead for the Skills Programme Management Office. The IRES Programme is a £25m, eight year change programme designed to promote greater collaboration between the six regional partners, and the affiliated FE/HE sector.

Alongside these wider enabler projects, the IRES Programme is supporting a Workforce Mobility Project, designed to support greater access to jobs and training opportunities throughout the city region through improved travel and two Skills Gateways designed to promote access to higher skilled, higher paid roles. Further examples of where the locating the GBR HQ in Fife would both help enable more opportunities for Fife and benefit from this work are:

- The Digital Driven Innovation Skills Gateway, led by the University of Edinburgh, this is developing training resources and conducting outreach to promote skills and careers in occupations linked to digital innovation and supporting organisations to better collate, analyse and use data more effectively to make relevant choices for their organisation.
- The Housing, Construction and Infrastructure Skills Gateway, led by Edinburgh Napier University is working with local employability partners to promote careers in design, engineering and construction, particularly to those from disadvantaged parts of the city region are including Fife

supporting progression into sustainable careers and promoting new construction innovations links to the green economy and retrofitting to support the carbon zero agenda.

Fife as part of SEStran Regional Transport Strategy Partnership and as published SEStran RTS refresh (2015) recognises that the SEStran area is a key driver of the Scottish Economy. Key business sectors within the SEStran area include Financial Services, Tourism, the Knowledge economy, Creative Industries and Retailing, all of which are crucially dependent on the ability of people, goods and ideas to connect easily locally, regionally, nationally and internationally. The importance of connectivity in supporting the competitive position of any major city-region is well recognised: "A connected city ... has a reliable, resilient infrastructure with strong transport and digital links to its workforce, its supply chain and its markets. Rail, road, sea, air and digital infrastructure link the city with its region, with neighbouring cities and with international markets"

Fife continues to collaborate and work with strategic partners to influence, guide, co-ordinate and deliver to ensure our transport and digital infrastructure keeps pace with evolving technology and international standards, is climate ready and resilient and enables inclusive access for all.

Underpinning all our connectivity requirements is the need for a sustainable approach that will support the long-term competitive position of the area through resource efficiency, social inclusion, and minimum environmental impact. The rail network has a key part to play in continuing to achieve these ambitions through rail gateways, developments, and improvements.

#### 4. Opportunities for Great British Railways

How will your location enable Great British Railways to engage with customers, the private sector and wider transport industry?


Fife Council has an excellent reputation and proven capacity for engagement and collaboration. The authority area is covered by regional transport plan authorities namely SEStran and Tactran respectively. As such we can help influence and configure respective transport planning strategies to align with identified needs.

During 2022 we are refreshing our Fife Local Transport Strategy, the basis of which is to meet collective customer, sector and transport industry needs whilst still optimising the UK and Scottish Governments focus on modernising rail travel, improving journey times and increasing patronage.

Fife has a good network of rail lines and rail stations therefore we can be a test bed for innovation including hydrogen train fuelling pilots and in time, proposals for automated, remotely controlled services, perhaps facilitating freight movements sustainably between locations.

Fife is also a candidate location for a forthcoming Green Freeports bid. This is to be led and submitted by Forth Ports championing the Forth Estuary corridor where a prospective estimated 50,000 new jobs could arise and where bolstered trade or tourism activity can occur from growth at Grangemouth, Rosyth, Edinburgh Airport or Leith respectively. This bid will at its core, for Fife include commitments to improved rail freight connections and to better enable passenger movements between strategic employment sites including Mid Fife, Rosyth and Longannet.

The Green Freeport bid will progress existing parallel investment commitments from the private sector via Babcock Marine at Rosyth which have committed to the established of the Arrol Gibb Innovation Campus – a centre for advanced manufacturing, nuclear technology development robotics. In tandem this work will progress partnership commitments elsewhere in Fife to develop knowledge exchange corridors, linked to academia research from University of St Andrews, each of which in turn will give GBRHQ access to skills, intelligence, and supply chain expertise. Fife is also arguably uniquely, supporting the reinstalment by Transport Scotland of the former Levemnouth branch rail line ensuring that Scotland's last urban conurbation not to be served by a direct rail link is so once more; and ensuring that the benefits UK wide of improved rail connectivity are realised for business and population like.



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
